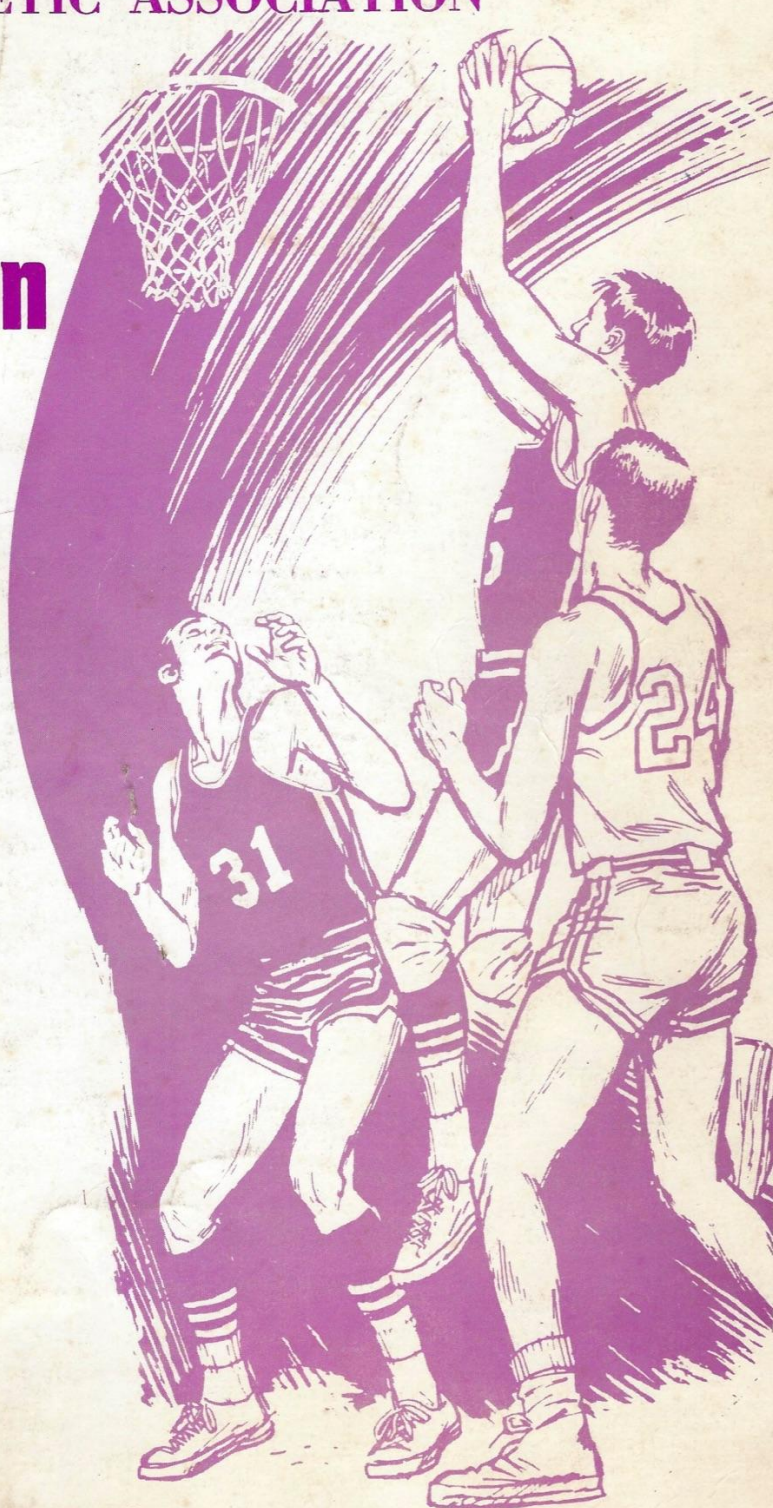

The name "Moe" Drilling is synonymous with Christian ideals. His unselfish dedication to Catholic education, is only surpassed by the example he sets for all who come in contact with him.

He started his career in the Diocesan high schools in 1954, at Bishop Ryan. His coaching career began immediately, as he became head varsity baseball coach in the spring of that same year. The Georgetown Cup, symbol of baseball supremacy, was a frequent visitor to the Ryan trophy case, due to the effort of some fine teams piloted by "Moe" Drilling.

In the fall of '54, he became associated with varsity football, and assumed the head coaching job in 1960. His finest year in football at Ryan was the '69-'70 school year, when he posted a won 6, lost 2 record, including a very satisfying victory over St. Joe's that same year turned out to be Ryan's last, which marked the beginning of a new era for "Moe."

He assumed his new duties as teacher of math, head baseball and football coach at Cardinal O'Hara in Tonawanda. Ryan's loss became O'Hara's gain.

His name became a household word at O'Hara, as in his first season as varsity football coach, he led his charges to a 7-1 record, O'Hara's best ever in Burke League competition. Needless to say, his baseball teams have been contenders ever since taking over at the Tonawanda school.

You can often find "Moe" spending much of his time in the summer coaching his high school teams in various summer baseball leagues. All year round, he devotes what little time he has left to St. Benedict's Church, where he has been a parishioner for many years. He is a man who wears many hats and wears them well. With all these activities, he still finds time to spend with his wife, Pauline and their eight children, ranging in age from 15 to 23 years.

"Moe" Drilling is a very special person to all who know him. To his students he is a dedicated teacher and friend, to his colleagues he represents knowledge, understanding, and wisdom. He is the epitome of a man who pledged his life in service to others. In the words of Frank Signorelli, one of his closest associates and friends, "being associated with him in school and on the athletic field, I know of no one who is more dedicated, considerate, loyal and friendly to family, school, and friends than "Moe" Drilling." . . .
