JOHN RYBAK



Back in the early 1930's, Johnny Rybak was a star athlete in football and basketball at Canisius College. After graduation, during the depression years, jobs were hard to come by. Almost by accident, he was offered and accepted a position as teacher, coach and supervisor of boys at St. Mary's School for the Deaf.

John became a certified teacher of the deaf and began teaching book-keeping, typing, I. B. M. and other business courses, He also initiated a comprehensive athletic program and it is in this field that he is best known for his tremendous achievements.

Today, some thirty years later, the one-time Golden Griffin Hero has become a champion of the physically handicapped. The account of his work has become all but legendary.

During his twenty-seven years at St. Mary's, John's teams chalked up incredible victories. In 1950 his boys reached the coveted Manhattan Cup Play-Off finals. For six consecutive years, they captured the tournament titles at the Eastern States Schools for the Deaf Athletic Association, a feat unequalled by any other school to date.

One of the founders of the Monsignor Martin Catholic High School Association, John has served as President of the Western New York High School League, the Eastern States Schools for the Deaf Athletic Association, and the New York State Association of Educators of the Deaf, and held office in countless civic and athletic associations. A member of the Canisius College Sports Hall of Fame, Johnny has also received the Edmund Campion Gold Medal, the Brotherhood Sportsmanship Award and has been named National Coach of the Year.

As Assistant to the Principal at St. Mary's, Rybak currently serves in a number of areas. He is Chairman of the High School Business Department, Director of Vocational Education, Physical Education and Athletics, and Placement Officer.

Rybak has been offered many lucrative jobs at other institutions but he considers his position at St. Mary's as the job which God intended as his life's work. His unwavering dedication might well serve as a model for any man who desires to "witness for Christ" in the modern apostolate.
